



Lesson 1: Americans expect higher standards from healthcare companies

 Elizabeth Holmes and Martin Shkreli were both excoriated by the public for aggressive pursuit of business goals.

• In just about any other industry, the same actions would have brought praise, not criticism.





Lesson 2: Accountability to patients is very weak

 Holmes and Shkreli were convicted of harming investors, NOT patients.






Main Ideas for Today

The Four Sources of Accountability








Example: Traffic Safety

- <u>Laws</u>: traffic laws, driver licensing, vehicle standards
- <u>Social norms</u>: respect for other drivers and pedestrians
- Market forces: insurance rates
- Organizational controls: apply to commercial drivers











Market Accountability

- When market competition works well, it:
 - » Keeps prices under control
 - » Improves quality
 - » Allocates resources to where they have the most benefit
 - » Promotes innovation
- Why isn't this working in the healthcare industry?







Free markets require:

- Level playing fields
- Clear rules
- Strong enforcement









Where are the healthcare referees?

- Ensuring price transparency
- Ensuring the sufficient competition
- Punishing organizations who cheat
- Punishing executives that profit at expense of patients













 Positive motivators: Reputation, social status, positive regard from peers

Negative motivators: Shame, bad reputation, stigma










How do Uber and Lyft manage drivers?

- Independent contractors, not employees
- Detailed metrics on every aspect of driver activity

• Lesson: The less formal authority you have over a supplier/partner, the better your metrics need to be.











What to do if you believe your organization is misbehaving?

- Step 1: Talk with your manager
- Step 2: If the violation is serious, and you're being ignored, you can:
 - » Contact a regulator
 - » Contact an accreditation agency, e.g. CAP
 - » Contact the press
